

Yearly participation in the CCP remains mandatory as outlined in the legislation (*The Registered Nurses Act, 1988*) and the bylaws, however the program will change effective December 1, 2022 for the 2023 registration year onward. Here is a chart that outlines those changes.

<b>WHAT IS THE SAME?</b>	<b>WHAT IS DIFFERENT?</b>
Registrants still need to review the practice standards that apply to their nursing designation annually to refresh their understanding and familiarity with professional practice standards.	There is no need to complete any tickboxes that indicate each indicator under the broad practice standards statements has been considered and reviewed as part of the self-assessment.
Registrants still need to complete a reflective self-assessment and then develop a learning plan that identifies their learning goals and what activities they will complete to enable them to achieve their learning goals successfully.	<p>The learning plan will be based on the registrant reflecting on a simple self-assessment question- “What will be the focus of your learning goal(s) based on the standard(s) you have chosen for this licensure year?” During development of the learning plan, the RN will link the learning goals to one or more of the broad practice standards for their designation.</p> <p>Registrants must be able to provide evidence of a documented learning plan.</p> <p>Registrants that have more than one designation [NP or RN(AAP)] will no longer have to complete both the RN and NP or AAP self-assessment process. As of December 1, 2022, an RN practicing in more than one category must include learning goals and activities that relate to their primary role and where the learning will have the most positive impact on their competence as an RN.</p>
An evaluation to determine level of success in completing the learning plan needs to be undertaken through the	Peer feedback is no longer a CRNS requirement. However, should a registrant wish to seek out the feedback

This can be used by the registrant as an evaluative tool should they choose</p>
<p>Registrants should still interact with the CCP throughout the registration year and track their ongoing learning as it links to their learning plan.</p> <p>Registrants can still update and adjust their learning plan should their role or priorities change throughout the licensure year.</p>	<p>An online platform will be implemented that will enable registrants to develop an interactive profile and learning plan.</p> <p>Resources within the platform will support registrants to identify learning opportunities that might support them to meet their goals.</p> <p>Documents such as certificates of attendance or other resources can be uploaded into the profile as the registrant completes learning activities.</p>
<p>Practice consultants remain available to support registrants as they engage with the CCP process and resources will be available to help guide registrants as they complete the CCP.</p> <p>Registrants must retain their CCP documents for the past five <b>years</b> including retirees, non-practicing, inactive and those on leave from an employer.</p>	<p>During transition from the previous CCP process to the new one, registrants will likely have a combination of paper and electronic based documents.</p>
<p>The CRNS has a regulatory obligation to monitor registrant participation in the CCP and the criteria for the CCP verification is determined by the registrar.</p>	<p>The process formerly referred to as an <i>audit</i> will be referred to as a <i>verification</i>. Verifying there is evidence of the ongoing learning registrants engage in is truly the focus of the process.</p>

<p>The CCP offers flexibility to develop goals that enhance registrant competence in their practice area(s).</p>	<p>The new streamlined approach that was developed following months of consultation with registrants and an advisory committee is intended to assist registrants to meaningfully engage in the CCP process.</p>
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
